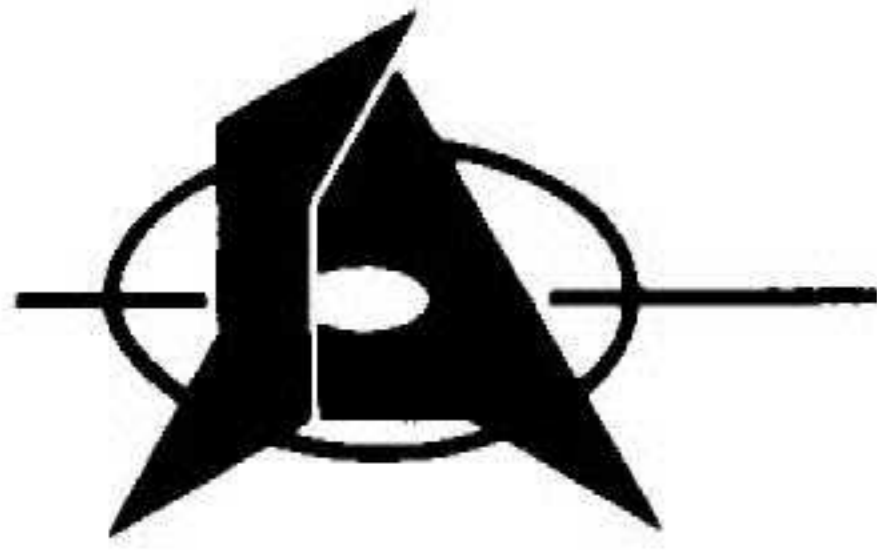

BUYING A BIKE?

Are you thinking of buying a bicycle but are overwhelmed by all of your possible choices? Well here are some items that will help make your decision a little easier.

HOW MANY SPEEDS DO YOU WANT?

You can decide this according to where you want to ride and the amount of weight being carried.

3-speeds are good for casual or neighborhood driving, but not good for hilly riding or longer distances.

The prices vary from \$50 to \$100 some good brand names are Raleigh, Huffy, and Schwinn.

Less-expensive 5 and 10-speeds are good for casual, commuting and hilly riding. Prices range from \$65 to just over \$100. Some good brand name are Atala, Nishiki, and Vista.

Better 10-speeds. Ideal for long trips, are lighter weight and faster. Prices start at around \$125. Some better brand names are Peugeot, Raleigh and Nishiki.

WHERE SHOULD YOU BUY?

It is better to buy your bike at a bike specialty store rather than a big department store. Usually the specialty shops know more about bikes and will help you with all the necessary adjustments and equipment.

GET THE RIGHT SIZE

You should be able to straddle the pipe running from the handle bar post to the seat post with a couple of inches between it and your crotch. Frame sizes vary from 17 to 25 inches. This will allow you to have better control in any situation that might arise.

WHAT KIND OF BRAKES AND TIRES ARE THE BEST?

Centerpull brakes provide better braking power than the side-pull variety.

Tire wise, tubular tires seem to be your best bet. They are lighter, more responsive and easier to change.

The rest is up to you. Check the workmanship, It's sturdiness and see that it handles the way you would like it to. With this information to use as a guide you should not find it so perplexing, trying to select the right bike for your needs.

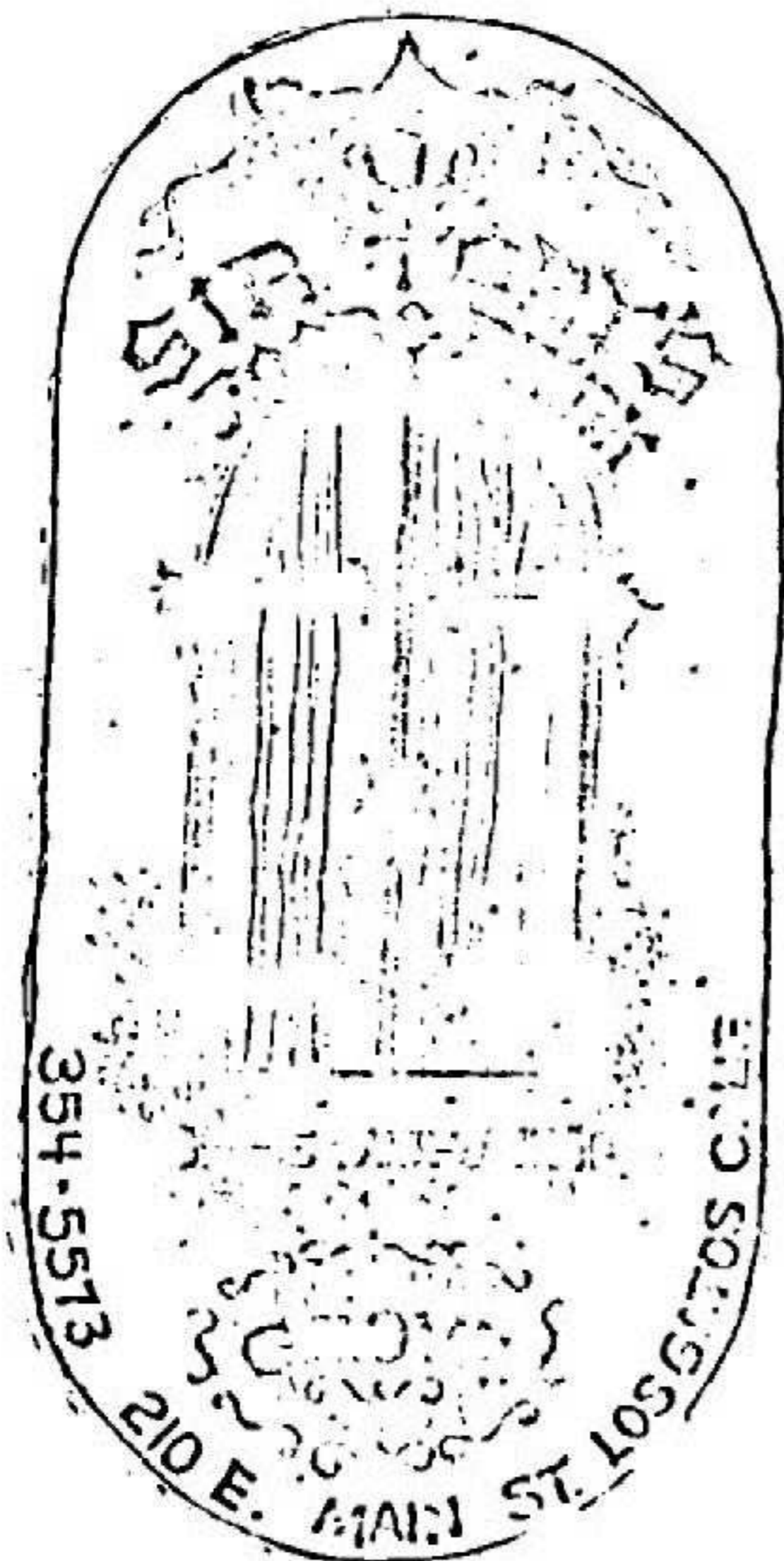
"The ATARI Epicure"

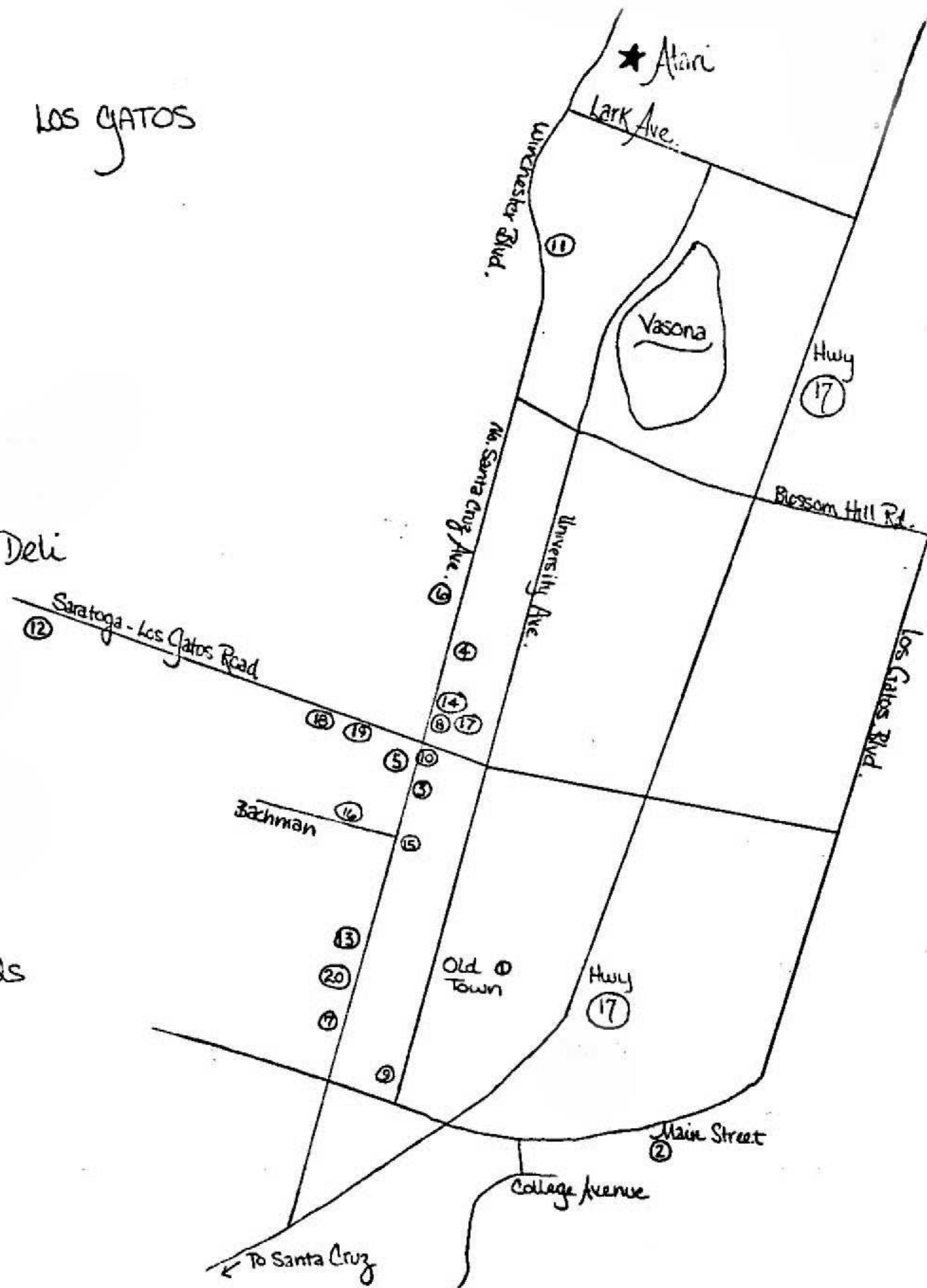

## RECIPES

### SHRIMP SALAD

1 pkg. lemon gelatin  
1 tsp. sugar  
1/8 tsp. pepper  
1/2 bay leaf  
1 cup chopped celery  
1/2 cup chopped olives, ripe or green

1 pt. tomato juice  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 Tbsp. vinegar  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
3/4 cup chopped green pepper  
1 can Shrimp

Boil 1/2 the tomato juice with salt, pepper and bay leaf 5 minutes. Pour over gelatin. Stir until dissolved. Then add remaining juice. Chill until slightly set. Add celery, pepper, olives, onion and shrimp. Pour into 8 x 8 x 2" pan. Garnish with olives and shrimp. Thin mayonnaise or salad dressing with half and half cream and serve.

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### RICE-STUFFED TOMATOES

6 medium size tomatoes  
1 1/2 cups cooked rice  
1 1/2 cups grated cheese  
2 Tbsp. melted butter or margarine

1 tsp Worcestershire Sauce  
1 Tbsp. chopped onion  
2 Tbsp. chopped parsley

Scoop out insides of tomatoes. Drain. Mix rest of ingredients, saving some of the cheese. Fill tomatoes with the mixture and sprinkle with the remaining cheese. Bake at 350° for about 15 minutes. Serves 6.

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### ALL-IN-ONE HAMBURGER CASSEROLE

1 cup instant rice  
3 Tbsp. flour  
1 tsp. chili powder  
1 1/2 tsp salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper

1 lb ground beef  
2 Tbsp. chopped onion  
1 No. 2 can tomatoes  
1 (12 oz.) can corn  
2 Tbsp. butter

Grease 2 quart casserole. Spread rice over bottom. Mix flour, chili powder, salt and pepper. Sprinkle 1/3 over rice, dot with 1/2 tsp. butter.

Mix ground beef with onion and spread over rice. Repeat flour mixture and butter. Make a layer of the tomatoes, including liquid; repeat flour and butter. Spread corn on top and dot with remaining butter. Cover and bake at 350° for 45-50 minutes. Serves 6.

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### TARDINESS ON THE JOB CONSIDERED WORSE THAN POT SMOKING BY MODERN EMPLOYERS

Employee lateness is considered a far greater offense than pot-smoking by many modern business managers, according to a recent survey of executives in 1,650 American firms.

The concession to marijuana smokers is only one of a number of major adjustments being made by employers attempting to attract "new breed" employees, the survey conducted by Prentice-Hall, Inc., and the American Society for Personnel Administration showed.

Fifty-two percent of executives in retail sales companies said they would not fire an employee who uses marijuana off the job but only 9 percent of the same executives said they would relax penalties for tardy employees.

The spread was not quite so wide in other business fields. However, even in such traditionally straitlaced businesses as banks and insurance companies, executives agreed that off-work pot-smoking was not as great a crime as coming to work late.

Approximately 42 percent of the 1,650 firms said they would hire an employee even though they knew he smoked marijuana off the job.

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### THE 10 MOST BORING JOBS IN THE WORLD

What are the 10 most boring jobs in the world? After a survey, the Institute for Policy Studies at Harvard University came up with this list:

Assembly line worker, operator of a self-service elevator, pool typist, bank guard, copying machine worker, keypunch operator, highway toll collector, car watcher in a tunnel, file clerk, and housewife.
